## Welcome

Commissioner Levacy opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance.

## **Update on Bond Financing**

Michael Burns with Baird spoke about bond refinancing options. He presented five options based on how the county would like to repay the bonds.

Commissioner Levacy asked about the timeframe related to bond savings opportunities and interest rates.

Mr. Burns replied that the Ohio Revised Code provides ninety days prior to bond maturity and that interest rates may fluctuate a 1/4%, but that the rate is based on the federal governments' actions.

Commissioner Davis, Mr. Hampson, and Ms. Knisley discussed the General Fund's 2025 carryover and recent appropriations and encumbrances.

Commissioner Davis stated that the two issues to consider are timing and whether to put additional monies on capital improvements. He spoke about the five and ten year financial forecasts of the County and added that the County needed to take any action possible to help the five year forecast.

Mr. Burns stated that the County's Treasurer's Office has been earning a lot from investment interest, but the earnings will drop as the federal reserve lowers rates.

Auditor Brown spoke about the GFOA benchmark and best practices related to the county's cash balance. She added that the County had recently filed its annual financial report and that the County's finances are strong.

Commissioner Davis stated that the bond financing options are worthy of consideration and that it is healthy fiscal management to be aware of potential financial problems and solutions for the out years.

Commissioner Levacy stated that it is worth an additional conversation.

Mr. Burns stated he is happy to have another conversation regarding the bonds.

Mr. Kaper spoke about investments with STAR Ohio and liquid assets.

Commissioner Davis stated that the Commission is aware that the interest earnings are a transient number that will move as the federal governments moves.

## Listen & Learn, Hunger Awareness

Jeanette Curtis, Executive Director of Fairfield County 211

Ms. Curtis spoke about H3, the county's hunger prevention alliance. Hunger is a more complex issue, and the USDA has identified it as food insecurity with is a lack of healthy food. Unemployment, poverty, transportation barriers, communication barriers, and income shocks are all components of food insecurity. Feeding America puts together a yearly report on food insecurities and 63% of people with food insecurity are above eligibility for SNAP benefits. In 2023, calls to 211 skyrocketed to 30,327 calls, and 36% of all calls received were food related. The number one referral we have issued over the last 15 years is for food.

Commissioner Davis asked what Ms. Curtis to explain what is like to go to a food pantry.

Ms. Curtis replied that every pantry has a different process. Some tell you to come in, and some have you make an appointment. You do not have to show proof of income, but you must sign a declaration of need. The H3 alliance represents hunger, health and hope. 211 has an interpretation service and assists with communication to local pantries. The H3 alliance offers classes on budgeting, shopping for healthy foods, and more. Hunger Awareness Month aims to educate people on food insecurities and on how to get involved, volunteer, or donate. Ms. Curtis stated that offering transportation to a grocery store, picking up groceries, and checking on your neighbors, are some ways you can help. You can also help educate people about hunger and share recipes with people on items they may receive from a food pantry.

Commissioner Levacy stated that inflation is effecting everyone, especially those that are less fortunate.

Commissioner Fix stated that he struggles with the fact that such a large percentage of people in Fairfield County have food related issues.

Commissioner Davis shared about a time in his life when he experienced food insecurities.

## **Proclamations**

Commissioner Fix read proclamations for Hunger Action Month, Payroll Appreciation Week, Weights and Measures Month, and National Preparedness Month

Tiffany Nash, Jeanette Curtis, and Anna Tobin accepted the proclamation for Hunger Action Month. Ms. Nash and Ms. Curtis work with H3, and Ms. Tobin is the Executive Director for The Senior Hub and Meals on Wheels for Fairfield County.

Regular Meeting #38 - 2024 – September 3, 2024

Ms. Tobin stated that many of the county's seniors struggle every day and meals on Wheels is happy to offer them a meal and connect them with food supplements. She added that healthy meals help keep seniors from requiring facilities and special assistance.

Auditor Brown accepted the proclamation for Payroll Appreciation Week and stated that payroll has been in existence since 7000 B.C. The county does payroll for about 1000 individuals. In the private sector, people want access to their payroll when they work. The most common payroll is every other week but 10% of employees nationwide now get their pay daily.

Auditor Brown also accepted the proclamation for Weights and Measures Excellence. She stated the proclamation would be shared in the field with Agricultural businesses. The jobs of the Weights and Measures department is to ensure that consumers are getting what they paid for and that companies are getting what they expect.

Mr. Kochis, regarding National Preparedness Month, stated that he had very recently visited the 911 Memorial and there are many hazards in which we must try our best to be prepared.

## **Public Comment**

Ray Stemen of Lancaster offered his concerns for gambling in America and added he believes the money spent on gambling could be put to better use.

Kathy Brookes stated her intent to establish a sovereign state in Fairfield County.

Sherry Pymer of Walnut Township stated that she believes there are agreements occurring between solar companies, landowners, businesses, and organizations. She also spoke about the increase of costs for energy due to renewables.

### Hello!

Today, State Auditor Keith Faber issued *The General Standard for August 2024.* Auditor Faber stated in this newsletter that one of the ways that we can all help his office is to take the <u>AOS's new training</u> (about fraud and risk management) and learn how to identify the red flags of potential fraud, waste and abuse of tax dollars.

As a reminder, Fairfield County Human Resources sent a communication on July 9, 2024, to all employees addressing this required training. Please ensure the required training is completed <u>prior to September 28, 2024</u>.

To support the announcement in the AOS newsletter and the recently issued <u>Auditor of State bulletin 2024-005 Required Fraud Training</u>, we in the County Auditor's Financial Systems office would like to provide the following Word to the Wise.

As a public employee, you can help stamp out Fraud, Waste and Abuse! We sometimes get questions about what is fraud, waste, or abuse. The following information includes highlights from the AOS bulletin.

**Fraud**, for purposes of your reporting obligation, refers to the criminal concept of fraud, which occurs when a person knowingly uses deception to obtain a benefit for himself or another. It can also occur when a person knowingly causes, by deception, some detriment to another.

Fraud differs from an unintentional error or mistake, or theft, where there is no knowing use of deception.

## **Examples of Fraud** may include:

- Impersonating a government official to steal cash from a government cash collection point
- Creating fictional invoices and using public funds to pay them to yourself or a friend
- Falsifying timesheets for the purpose of gaining additional compensation or leave time
- Falsifying financial statements to cover up a redirecting of public money to a personal bank account Examples of Errors/Mistakes
- Posting a receipt for the incorrect amount due to a mathematical error

- Accidentally paying an invoice twice
- Inadvertently calculating utility bills at an old rate
- Collecting the student price for an adult ticket at a school sporting event
- Theft in office occurs when a public official commits any theft offense of a property or service owned or offered by a public governmental entity while using the official's office in aid of committing the theft.
  - An example of theft in office is <u>using the government's credit card, that</u> you have authority to use only through your position with the government entity, to pay for a personal expense.

**Waste** occurs in government when resources are used carelessly or extravagantly without adequate oversight.

## <u>Examples of Waste</u> may include:

- Overpaying for goods or services
- Unnecessary spending on projects
- Intentionally inefficient processes for a routine task

**Abuse** excludes fraud and non-compliance and involves actions that a prudent person would determine to be deemed unreasonable based on the circumstances.

## <u>Examples of Abuse</u> may include:

- Requesting to be reimbursed for an expensive meal
- Asking an employee to perform a task not within their scope of work, even after hours

If something doesn't look right, it is important to stay vigilant. Making a report is the first step in addressing Fraud, Waste and Abuse.

On a related matter, our <u>Internal Control Manual</u> addresses areas of internal control and defines how to establish Program Integrity, Segregation of Duties, and consideration for a Faud Risk Analysis.

- Management of the County government is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of the county are protected from loss, theft, or misuse and to ensure that adequate accounting data are compiled to allow for the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP).
- Program Integrity is a foundational concept that seeks to ensure that the County develops and maintains governance structures, controls, and processes to safeguard taxpayer resources. To accomplish this objective, Management of

the County government should consider the following aspects within their processes related to operations, reporting and compliance.

- Fraud Risk Analysis How exposed to fraud are you? Some areas to consider are frequent turnover of staff, size and types of payments, appropriate oversight, and ensuringyour functional area has clearly documented processes and procedures.
  - o After the risks have been identified, address control activities.
    - These include policies and procedures, techniques and mechanisms that help ensure risks are mitigated.
  - Performing a fraud risk analysis is essential for proper stewardship and accountability for government resources and for achieving effective and efficient program results.

## **Board of Revision Process - Application for Remission of Late-Payment Penalties**

A taxpayer may request a remission (removal) of a penalty that has been assessed against real estate or manufactured home taxes, and under Ohio law, certain circumstances support the remission of the penalties. Top circumstances include reasonable cause and not willful neglect, as well as serious injury or hospitalization. Applications are approved or denied by the Board of Revision.

### An Update on the Lot Split Application & Review of Pre-Approval of Legal Descriptions

Thanks to the committee focused on the lot split application. Multiple stakeholders reviewed responses to the request for information, and a contract development for an REA fund supported approach is underway. Criteria for the group review included ease of use for the public, sustainability, and cost effectiveness. Once contract development has concluded, there will be a beta period of testing prior to *full implementation in January of 2025*.

As housing and development continue to increase in Fairfield County, we are developing new services to support the public. We have introduced a new pre-approval process for legal descriptions, and the use of the service is growing. In the first year of introducing the voluntary service, 11.24% more legal descriptions have gone through this review process, saving time and resources for everyone. Questions and technical matters are answered more quickly with a pre-approval process.

- <u>Early Childhood Programs</u>: These services include programs such as Help Me Grow, Head Start, Ohio Early Intervention, Teens with Tots and more.

## ATHENA AWARD: JUDGE TERRE VANDERVOOT

Fairfield County Juvenile and Probate Court Judge Terre Vandervoot received the 2024 ATHENA Leadership Award from the Lancaster-Fairfield County Chamber of Commerce on August 1. The award honors women and organizations that demonstrate the highest level of professionalism, excel in their chosen field, devote time to their community, and open paths so that others may follow.

It's clear why Judge Vandervoot was selected as a recipient. She served 20 years as the first elected female prosecutor in her community before being appointed to her current position by Governor John Kasich in August 2013. She developed guiding principles for the Court centering decision-making on evidence-based models focused on public safety and the reduction of recidivism in juveniles.

Judge Vandervoort developed the first County diversion program for juvenile nonviolent first-time offenders. Additional new programs under Judge Vandervoort's guidance include a drop-in assessment center assisting the community in response to at-risk youth, mentoring services, a preventive community request for Services program, and Cyber Safety Education. Judge Vandervoort has done extensive court-wide training through the University of Cincinnati's Corrections Institute to implement best practice models and is constantly on the lookout for new programming options. In 2019, Judge Vandervoort established one of the first Guardianship Service Boards outside of Franklin County. Case managers employed by the GSB (as opposed to Court-appointed attorneys) can provide three times as many care hours to Fairfield County's vulnerable population.

### **DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT - FAIRFIELD COUNTY 2-1-1**

This month, we are featuring Fairfield County 2-1-1 and the tremendous impact it has on our county. A full-service, nationally accredited information and referral agency with a 24-7 call center, Fairfield County 2-1-1 assists tens of thousands of people every year.



The purpose of 2-1-1 is to provide "front door" case management services to individuals and families in need of resources in Fairfield County. This allows the person in need to be connected with the appropriate agency and ensures agencies get eligible individuals for their services. Individuals in need and linked to food, housing, counseling, and various other resources in Fairfield County. The efficiency of 2-1-1 maximizes community resources and reduces duplication of services by working closely with other agency partners. Additionally, 2-1-1 operates the 24/7 mental health crisis line, offers representative payee services, and offers community outreach education.

When people in Fairfield County are in need, they can call 2-1-1 any time of the day and those calls will be answered by a real person who is a trained professional with access to a comprehensive database.

### SNAP RECIPIENTS: PROTECT YOURSELF FROM POTENTIAL FRAUD

Protect yourself from SNAP card skimming! Skimming happens when a device is placed over a point-of-sale card reader that steals information for payment cards like SNAP. This means SNAP benefits can be stollen without your knowledge.

To protect your benefits, be sure to:

- Check your EBT balance regularly
- Monitor your transaction history. Immediately report your card if it is lost, no longer working, stolen or if you notice anything unusual.
- Do not share your card, card number or PIN.
- Change your PIN frequently.
- Choose a unique PIN which is NOT easily guessed.
- Report duplicates or unauthorized transactions immediately.
- Do not respond to social media posts, emails or text messages that ask you to enter your EBT card number and PIN to resolve issues or get extra funds.
- Never click on links that you receive through texts or emails unless it comes from a known, reliable, and expected source.



#### SCHOOL'S BACK IN SESSION -SCHOOL BUSES ARE BACK ON ROADS!

As our county schools return to class this month, it's important to remember that we all have a responsibility to keep our students safe by practicing safe driving in school zones and in

communities where buses are picking up and dropping off precious cargo! While



statistically, school buses are the safest way to transport children, it is up to all of us to ensure students are safe on their way to and from school. The greatest risk to a child isn't riding a school bus, but approaching or leaving one. That's why, as a vehicle driver, it is especially important to pay attention and follow these safety practices:

- Slow down in school zones be sure to follow flashing lights, safety signals and roadway markers at all applicable times. When in doubt, follow the lowest speed indicated for that zone.
- It is illegal for vehicle drivers to pass a school bus while the school bus stop-arm is extended, and the red lights are flashing. Failing to stop could result in injury or death to child pedestrians or their caretakers. Vehicle drivers must always come to a complete stop when a school bus stop-arm is extended, and the red lights are flashing.
- The overall best practice is to "always stop if there's a school bus." Yellow flashing lights indicate the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicles.
- Never pass on the right side of the bus, where children enter or exit. This is illegal and can have tragic results.
- Watch for children walking in the street, especially if there are no sidewalks in the neighborhood. Watch for children playing and gathering near bus stops.

By each of us doing our part to practice safe driving while school is in session, we can help our students have a safe, productive school year!

Brian said he likes that every day is different for him, and he can go from running records to administrative duties in a matter of hours.

"The Hall of Justice can be an intimidating place and people typically aren't here for fun," he said. "I enjoy doing my best to help them through the process in a matter in which they understand, and it always makes me feel good when they tell me I was so helpful, or when attorneys give our court compliments because we try to work as efficiently as possible."






#### Fair Fun!

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# State of the County: Growth, workforce development and transportation are the big issues

LANCASTER – The Fairfield County commissioners have talked about growth, workforce development and transportation issues for much of the past couple of years. Those three topics were also the focus of Tuesday's annual State of the County address at the Liberty Center.

Commissioner Jeff Fix said previous county commissioners may have pushed issues like those aside and did little so as not to make waves to just get re-elected.



"They did the minimum," he said. "They kicked the can down the road. They left the big issues for someone else to deal with after they retired."

Fix said the current commission does not do that and that neither do the other county elected officials.

"They all want to move things forward to find new and better ways to serve our constituents and to look to the future and to figure the best we can how to prepare for it," he said.

Fix said that led the county to form a <u>land use plan</u> earlier this year to help deal with the expected growth in the county in coming years.



In order to deal with that growth, the commissioners have touting workforce development, especially at the <u>county workforce center in Carroll</u>.

Commissioner Dave Levacy said employers need skilled workers and that the county is using many programs to provide them with workers. Levacy said younger workers must also know how to apply for a job, which he said some don't from his experience in owning Buckeye Lake Marina in Millersport.

"They don't present themselves well," he said. "So the first thing is a turnoff. That (learning) career readiness is very important. They know how to prepare a resume. They know how to present themselves and they know that it's important to show up on time. Today some young people think it's OK to show up for work 10, 15 minutes late. But it's not OK. So it's very good that they're being instructed on how to do that."

After Levacy spoke, commissioner Steve Davis talked about transportation, including the county's July 1 takeover of the <u>Lancaster-Fairfield Public Transit</u> system. He said as an Uber drive he's seen the struggle some have finding transportation to jobs and other places they need to go to.

Davis said some may call those with transportation issues lazy instead of living in poverty.

"What if they're trying to fight their way out?" he said. "That's really where I and my colleagues are coming from in terms of all these efforts that we're talking about today. Helping folks get the skills they need to get to work and trying to figure out if we can influence the price of living. And then how are they getting to and from work?"



#### 2024 State of the County Address #37 - 2024 Fairfield County Commissioners' Office August 27, 2024

#### **2024 State of the County**

Registration for the State of the County address officially began at 11:00 a.m., at the Liberty Center, 951 Liberty Dr., Lancaster, OH. The following Commissioners were present: Jeff Fix, Steve Davis and Dave Levacy. There were approximately three-hundred and forty two in attendance including County Administrator, Aundrea Cordle, the Commissioners' staff, elected officials from Fairfield County and the State of Ohio, and residents and business owners from throughout the region.

#### Welcome

Travis Markwood, President of the Lancaster Fairfield County Chamber of Commerce, welcomed everyone to the 2024 State of the County Address and spoke about the event sponsors. Kim Barlag, President of the Pickerington Chamber of Commerce, acknowledged all of the elected officials in attendance.

#### Posting of the Colors/Pledge of Allegiance

The Sheriff's Color Guard Posted the Colors and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mr. Markwood.

#### **Invocation**

Dr. David Uhl, Superintendent of the Fairfield County Board of Developmental Disabilities, gave the invocation.

#### **Introduction of County Commissioners and County Administrator**

Mr. Markwood introduced County Administrator Aundrea Cordle as the first speaker.

#### **County Administrator Aundrea Cordle**

County Administrator Aundrea Cordle welcomed everyone in attendance to the 2024 State of the County Address. She thanked the Chamber staff and Pickerington Chamber for their assistance. She focused on the "Power of Your Word" and what it means. Keeping your word is a critical component of any relationship. People quickly learn if someone has a history of not being able to keep their word. It not only is about respecting others, but respecting yourself and leading by example. She tied this idea back to the promises made and promises kept by the county and the County Commissioners. She explained that each of the three Commissioners will look back on recent years and look back on the initiatives that started as ideas or problems to solve, and will follow up with the progress that has been made over the last few years. She shared some of the big accomplishments with the Strategic Plan and drew attention to the centerpieces that detail the great progress that has been made in these areas of focus the county has been working on. She was also excited to feature how the county invested in the community with investments provided by the American Rescue Plan fiscal recovery funds, which ties directly back to the Strategic Plan.

#### **Commissioner Jeff Fix**

Commissioner Jeff Fix stated that Commissioners' predecessors had a tendency to fly under the radar in an attempt to continue getting reelected. He thanked his colleagues and other county elected officials and department heads for not doing the bare minimum and doing the things that are unpopular, but necessary. He provided his belief that if the County removes barriers to

working then it can help to decrease generational poverty. He spoke on the housing crisis and the disproportionate cost of housing versus other necessary expenditures. Without affordable places to live, other areas of people's lives are impacted as a result. He conducted a housing symposium several years ago to explain to local governments the need for smart growth and planning. Due to initial push-back, the Comprehensive Land Use Plan was pulled back for reevaluation. Commissioner Fix began meeting with each township, city and village to discuss the plan in greater depth. The County is on track to have cooperative agreements with various townships, cities and villages as a result of these discussions. By using new tax structures to have developers help pay for improvements in their areas, the County can save the taxpayer from any additional costs. He concluded by cementing that what the County is doing is only going to benefit residents, and introduced Commissioner Dave Levacy.

#### **Commissioner Dave Levacy**

Commissioner Dave Levacy thanked Commissioner Fix for all his help with housing and the Land Use Plan. He began his remarks by sharing that the country has experienced a sharp decline in the younger generations participating in the workforce. Years ago, he led the charge to build a Workforce Center in Fairfield County. His vision since the beginning has been to provide people with the skills to start their career and get good paying local jobs where they can be contributing members of their communities and flourish. The career readiness program has been a very important tool for the development of young professionals in their careers. The County has been working to build interest in junior high students in multiple areas of the trades at summer camps offered by the Workforce Center so they can be exposed to different career opportunities. More than 1000 students in Fairfield County have already received career readiness endorsements since the program began. He shared some success stories of students who went through the program and are now excelling in their fields, even receiving multiple promotions. The County is working to add more programs at the Workforce Center to increase the diversity of job skills and respond to the needs of the major companies coming to central Ohio. In conclusion of his remarks, Commissioner Levacy introduced Commissioner Steve Davis

#### **Commissioner Steve Davis**

Commissioner Davis thanked everyone in attendance for joining in a record breaking State of the County Address. He has been moved by what he has learned in his time as an Uber driver. He has learned that many of the people who are in poverty are trying to fight their way out but are unable due to a lack of transportation resources. Beginning July 1st, the County officially assumed governance of Lancaster-Fairfield Public Transit. Given the increasing importance of available transportation services, he believes this transition makes the most sense. Fairfield County is looking to improve transit in multiple ways besides buses. He also emphasized that the number of teenagers getting their drivers licenses is down to just 50%, which restricts their ability to get their first job. The Commissioners are not by law required to partake in these services, but they do so for the wellbeing of Fairfield County citizens. Another such initiative not required of the Commissioners was a pilot program to mitigate costs of electricity usage by installing a solar field on county property. These fiscal decisions that have resulted in positive impacts on the budget. Pivoting back to Transit, he believes the County is doing the right thing, and stated that in the past year, 100,000 people have called Transit and successfully got a ride. The on-demand services have also dramatically improved. The nature of the calls he has received as an Uber driver has changed as well, which he believes reflects the impact Transit has had on the community. He also announced the rebranding campaign of Lancaster-Fairfield Public Transit and encouraged everyone to give their best name suggestions. Finally. he thanked everyone for attending a record breaking State of the County.






## PLAT OF SURVEY Survey - 100/20841

# CDBG PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD PY 2023 CDBG CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

This agreement made as of, 20, by and between the Board of Commissioners
of Fairfield County, Ohio, hereinafter designated as "County" and theVillage of Sugar
Grove_, hereinafter designated as "the Village", which for and in consideration of their mutual
promises made herein agree as follows:

#### I. COUNTY PAYMENTS TOWARD CDBG PROJECTS

The Board of County Commissioners of Fairfield County, Ohio shall make payments up to \$470,000.00 towards the cost of construction for the following Projects, as selected by the \_\_\_\_Village for PY \_\_2023\_\_ CDBG Critical Infrastructure Program funding, or as such budget is revised with the approval of the Ohio Department of Development:

#### **ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:**

• Rocket Way Sewer Project

The source of such County payments shall include and only include a PY 23 grant to the County from the Ohio Development Services Agency through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Allocation program, Grant Number B-X-23-1AV-1 and County payments are therefore conditions upon actually receiving such CDBG Allocation funds.

The disbursement and expenditure of County CDBG Allocation program funds shall be made only in compliance with the requirements of the County's GRANT AGREEMENT with the State of Ohio. All work must be completed by August 31, 2025, unless such time period is extended by the Ohio Department of Development. Disbursements are limited by the approved "Project Costs and Use of Funds" to costs directly associated with the GRANT AGREEMENT.

#### II. COUNTY COOPERATION

The County Commissioners pledges its cooperation, support, and assistance to administer and disburse the CDBG Allocation program, funds in such a manner as to expedite and complete the Project in the best interests of the as well as in compliance with the requirements of the CDBG program and all other applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

#### III. OTHER COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES

The County Commissioners shall assume the responsibilities for the administration of the CDBG Allocation program not otherwise set forth as being assumed by the Village in this Participation Agreement, it being further understood that even those responsibilities

being assumed by the Village insofar as the State of Ohio is concerned are first and foremost the responsibility of the County.

#### IV. COUNTY'S CLAIMS ON OWNERSHIP OF PROJECT IMPROVEMENTS

The County Commissioners will not have any claims on the ownership or use of any of the public improvements constructed or installed through the expenditure of County CDBG Allocation program funds except as otherwise set forth in this Participation Agreement. Likewise, the County will be free of any and all liabilities with regard to the public improvements except as regards its responsibilities to the State of Ohio for the proper administration of the CDBG funds.

#### V. VILLAGE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Village shall designate a Project Representative who will be responsible for coordinating with the County on Project activities and shall give the Project Representative the authority to work with the Project Engineer. Such activities may include delineating the Project location, locating of utilities, which may be affected by the Project, and other items requested by the Engineer which will enable the Contractor to properly construct the Project. In addition, the Village shall give the Project Representative the authority to approve the Project plans and specifications, any necessary Project change orders and all contractor payments on behalf of the Village. All such approval will be given along with those of the County and the Engineer. They (through the direction of the County) will be responsible for securing any required easements, waivers, appraisals, etc. in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended. The Project Representatives shall attend the Pre-Construction Conference and assist with local needs (i.e. provisions of a place to store materials near the site, site inspections in addition to those conducted by the Engineer, etc.). The Village shall incur the costs for design and construction inspection of the Project.

#### VI. <u>BIDDING</u>

The County shall be primarily responsible for bidding, contracting and construction management for all work elements outlined in the Grant Agreement with the Ohio Department of Development and for compliance with state and federal bidding and contracting regulations.

#### VII. OWNERSHIP AND USE OF PROJECT IMPROVEMENTS

Upon commencement of a substantial portion of the Project public improvements, the Village shall have and assume all ownership of such improvements, materials, etc. which are associated with the Project not otherwise remaining under ownership of a contractor or vendor and the Village shall have and assume all such ownership and liability upon completion of the Project. The Village agrees to retain ownership of and to operate and provide reasonable maintenance of the Project improvements for the purposes they were

intended for a period of ten (10) years or more following completion of Project activities funded in whole or in part with CDBG Allocation program funds.

The Village agrees to prohibit discrimination in the use of or benefits from the Project improvements on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or handicap in accord with State and Federal laws and regulations. The Village further agrees to operate the facilities in such a manner as to assure maximum feasible benefit to persons of low and moderate income households.

During such ten (10) year period if for any reason the Village is no longer able to maintain or operate the Village owned Project improvements for the purposes they were intended or in compliance with the terms of this Participation Agreement, the Village shall inform the County in writing of such actions or circumstances and shall fully cooperate with the County to make the most appropriate changes to comply as nearly as possible with the CDBG program intent and regulations.

#### VIII. ADDITIONAL FINANCING

The Village shall obtain and provide all additional financing needed to complete all Project public improvements. In the event the Village becomes aware of any problems in providing and/or obtaining all additional financing needed, the Village shall immediately inform the County in writing and shall fully cooperate with the County in writing. The County will not approve any change orders above the amount of funds budgeted for this activity without prior Village approval.

#### IX. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No member, official or employee of the Village shall have any personal interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or in the GRANT AGREEMENT conveying the CDBG Allocation funds to the County, nor shall any such member, official or employee participate in any decision relating to this Agreement or to the GRANT AGREEMENT which affects his/her personal interests or the interests of any corporation, partnership or association in which he/she is directly or indirectly, interested.

#### X. ACCESS TO RECORDS

The County, the Ohio Department of Development, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Comptroller of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers and records of the Village which are directly pertinent to the CDBG Allocation and program and the use of its funds or any other funds on this Project, for the purpose of the making audit, examination, excerpts and transcriptions.

#### XI. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

This Participation Agreement may be terminated by either party if there is substantial evidence that the other party failed to fulfill its responsibilities under the terms of this

This Participation Agreement may be terminated by either party if there is substantial evidence that the other party failed to fulfill its responsibilities under the terms of this Agreement or under the GRANT AGREEMENT attached hereto. Any such termination must be accomplished in writing. In the event of termination by either party, the Village shall not enter into any new or additional obligation of the CDBG Allocation funds or any contracts which are in any other way dependent on the expenditure of the CDBG Allocation funds. In the event of termination by either party, the County shall continue to be responsible for the expenditure of CDBG Allocation funds to fulfill Village obligations or contracts which were entered into prior to such termination, such responsibility being dependent on cooperative negotiation between both parties as to the least objectionable arrangements for closing out all such obligations and being dependent on the advice of and approval of the Ohio Department of Development.

#### XII. AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

This Participation Agreement may be amended by the parties upon their mutual written agreement.
