Review Meeting

The Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. at 210 E. Main St., Lancaster, OH. Commissioner Levacy called the meeting to order, and the following Commissioners were present: Jeff Fix, Steve Davis and Dave Levacy. Welcome

Commissioner Levacy opened the meeting by welcoming everyone in attendance.

Family Y Update

Fairfield County YMCA Chief Executive Officer, Jason Booth, stated he has been at the YMCA for two years. He added they are often asked, "What is the YMCA?" The YMCA's mission is centered around youth development, health and wellness, community engagement, family services, and inclusive spaces. He added that YMCA (Y) services include food and blood drives, disaster relief assistance, parent support programs, just to name a few. In 2023 membership grew 16.5%. We have now recovered from the damage done by COVID and are servicing almost 8000 members. We recently received funding from the State of Ohio to replace our dehumidifier for the Wendel pool. We are serving Fairfield Union and Bloom-Carroll School Districts with school-aged childcare in the schools. We have a new three-year strategic plan which includes renovating the 1960's Robert K. Fox facility. In 2027, the Y will be 100 years old and there are many programs that the Y can do and has done.

Commissioner Davis thanked Mr. Booth for his presentation and spoke about staying at the Y during the day as a child. He asked how the programs from his youth look today.

Mr. Booth replied that the Y has summer programming, but kids are not there all day as they were sometimes in the past.

Commissioner Davis asked if kids could spend the day at the Y if they are not a member.

Mr. Booth replied that they must be a member or a guest of a member for safety reasons.

Commissioner Davis asked if there was a way for a family to drop a child during the day.

Mr. Booth replied they could through Summer Camps and evening programs.

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Commissioner Davis stated we are attempting to develop plans to help families work to alleviate impediments from working.

Mr. Booth replied that the Y can offer childcare but is limited. Children must be 13 years of age or older to enter the building by themselves.

Commissioner Davis clarified that he was not putting childcare responsibilities on the Y but was just asking about availability.

Commissioner Levacy asked about the Y's capacity to provide childcare and added that he was involved recently in a Workforce conversation and daily childcare has reached as high as \$10 per hour per child.

Commissioner Fix stated his appreciation for the Y's willingness to be helpful in solutions for families. I am excited for the future of the Y and your leadership there.

Mr. Booth stated his appreciation for the opportunity to speak and added that the Y could provide satellite childcare.

Commissioner Davis asked about a capital campaign and when it would begin

Mr. Booth stated that the Board of Directors is exploring preparatory steps to launch a campaign, and that renovations could be \$5 million or more.

Commissioner Levacy spoke about support from State Representatives.

Commissioner Davis asked if there was something after childcare that needs addressed.

Mr. Booth replied that childcare is in the forefront, but we know obesity programs, engagement, and senior services are also needed.

Regional Liaison for the Ohio Auditor of State to Present Award of Distinction

Regional Liaison for the Ohio Auditor of State, Scott Brown, presented Fairfield County with the Award of Distinction which is presented to local governments that meet certain criteria. The award represents the hard work of staff and employees who maintain the county's excellence and who understand fiscal responsibility. Mr. Brown thanked the Commissioners for allowing him time on the agenda. And stated that it was his honor, on behalf of State Auditor Faber, to be there

Dr. Brown thanked the elected officials and department heads for their assistance in fiscal excellence. We are reaching out to our stakeholders regarding the distinction that goes with this award. Ms. Hoskinson's leadership is assisting the county with fiscal integrity.

Public Comments

Ed Mulholland of Sebaugh Drive in Zanesville stated he is a volunteer with the United Sovereign Americans and added that he believed the 2022 general election may have not been valid. He went on to read a resolution prepared by the United Sovereign Americans regarding fair elections. The resolution that was presented is in the minutes under items that were submitted by the public.

Hanna Mohr of Marion Avenue in Zanesville, and Sheryl Phebus of Taylor Road in Zanesville, continued reading the remainder of the presented resolution.

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Cindy Thompson of Dresden Rd in Zanesville summarized the resolution presented by the Sovereign Citizens and asked the Commissioners to consider it.

Sherry Pymer of Walnut Township offered her concerns for solar energy farms and presented additional signed petitions that are available in the minutes under items submitted by the public.

Old Business

Commissioner Davis attended the CCAO/CCEO Central Region meeting. There was some discussion during that meeting regarding additional funding available for jails. He wishes to potentially pursue the grant for the jail fencing. Lastly, he stated that the grand opening of the fair was very well attended. He gave a shoutout to Champaign County for hosting an impressive CCAO/CCEO Central Region meeting.

Commissioner Fix continues to meet with townships and villages on their cooperative agreements. He thanked Holly Mattei and Tony Vogel for their assistance during the Pleasant Township meeting. He attended a meeting with individuals from 16 counties to talk about working together to maximize opportunities.

Commissioner Levacy spoke about MARCS tower options.

Commissioner Davis asked if additional tower space could be rented.

Mr. Kochis stated that nothing could be added to the local tower and that the Millersport tower is not under the county’s control.

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New Business

Commissioner Davis spoke with Clerk of Courts Branden Meyer about space issues at the Hall of Justice. He also met with Director Hampson regarding budget projections.

Commissioner Fix will be hosting a central region housing symposium to talk about the housing crisis in Central Ohio, with the hope that other counties will make more effort to address the housing shortage. He added that the Lt. Governor would be attending the meeting at the Wigwam to address housing.

Commissioner Levacy stated he will be meeting with Director Baldrige of the Ohio Department of Agriculture at the fair following the Budget Hearings that day.

Treasurer Bahnsen issued an RFP for a four-year contract. He also encouraged everyone to consider donating to those impacted by the hurricanes.

Engineer Upp stated the work on Refugee Road seems to be working according to their studies and that his staff is preparing for winter weather. He added his appreciation of the support for the Salt Barn. He also spoke about beginning the process for training for Commercial Driving Licenses.

Ms. Cordle thanked Engineer Upp for his willingness to explore that training possibility.

Engineer Upp stated that the number of applicants his office receives with CDL's is slim and that training would allow additional applicants to be considered.

Commissioner Fix stated the changes at Refugee Road have made a significant positive impact on the people that travel that road every day.

Commissioner Davis asked Mr. Kochis if there is a call that goes out to emergency management agencies across the country when there is a natural disaster like the hurricanes in the south.

Mr. Kochis stated there is an EMAC system that calls for assistance from EMA teams and that the upper echelon of those teams is Ohio Task Force One.

Clerk of Courts Meyer stated he has family in Tennessee that is close to the impacted areas but are currently safe. He added that there are many that need donations and prayers.

Dr. Brown stated that her office is pulling together donations for the Red Cross. She stated there are more than 1100 animals that will be weighed on 14 scales at the Fairfield County Fair. Dr. Brown also spoke about the upcoming "Making Numbers Count" seminar and "Financial Leadership Academy."

Mr. Vogel spoke about the great tool that the ERP system will provide and the corresponding training.

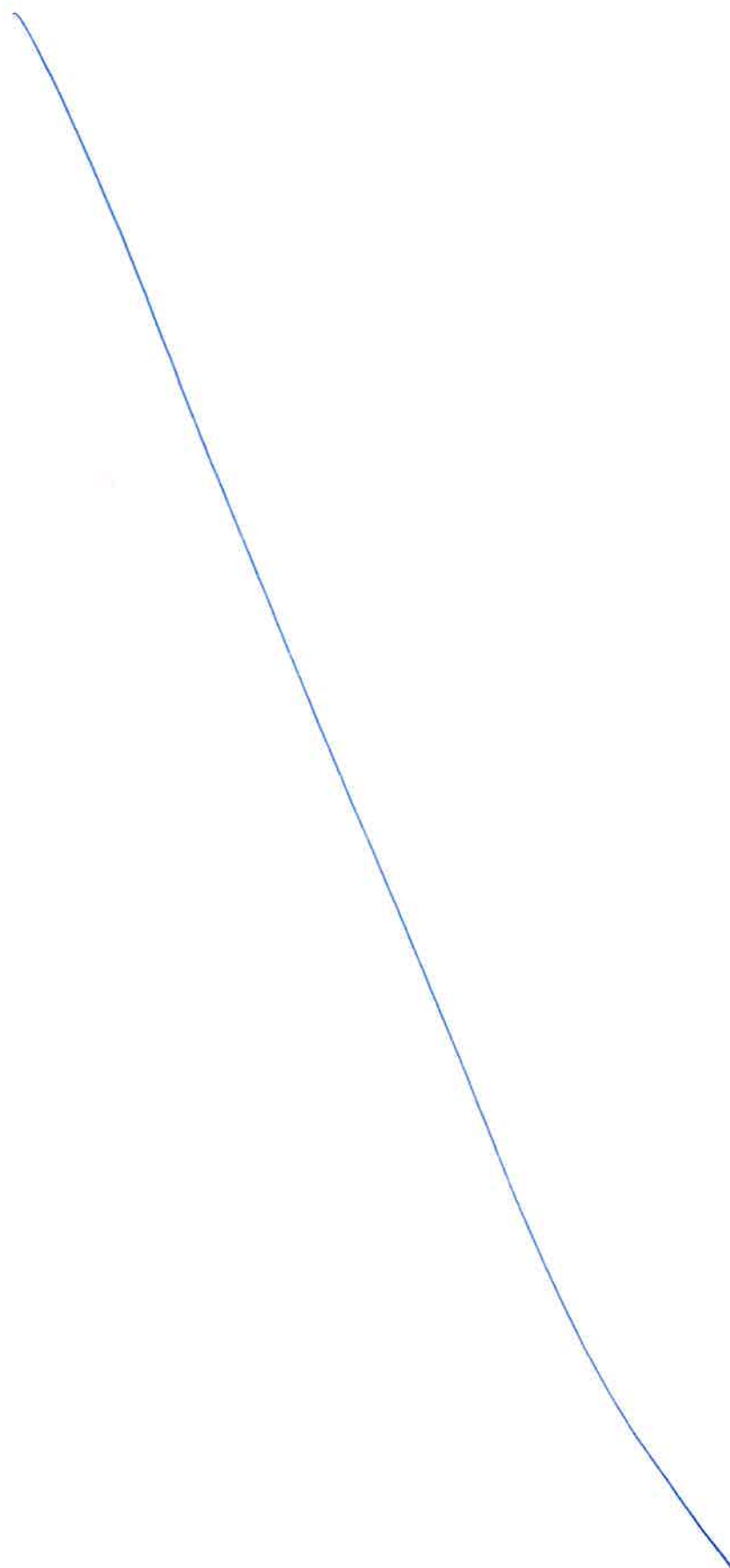

As you know, we wrote to you on July 29, 2024 to inform you that Post Consumer Brands announced that it will conduct employee separations due to the closure and sale of its Lancaster facility located at 3775 Lancaster New Lexington Rd. SE, Lancaster, OH 43130. This action is expected to be permanent, and the entire facility will close.

As we previously informed you, employee separations in connection with this action are expected to occur on October 4, 2024 and October 31, 2024, with four employees remaining to perform critical functions during the period the facility is shutdown pending the sale of the facility on a date yet to be determined. These four remaining employees will separate from employment with Post Consumer Brands upon the sale of the Lancaster facility.

We now write to inform you that, due to business needs, one non-union employee's separation date will change from October 31, 2024 to March 31, 2025.

I live on St Rt 188 just west of Cedar Hill Rd. In the last couple of years, semi-truck traffic has increased dramatically on St Rt 188. These semi-trucks are using their engine brakes heading east going into the curve at Cedar Hill Rd. causing an incredible amount of noise for home owners and at all times during a 24 hour period.

Weights and Measures Outreach

As we approach the Fairfield County Fair, we have prepared videos to show the role of the Weights and Measures Inspectors at the **Fairfield County Fair**. The videos are on our website, and they were in the most recent newsletter. Earlier this year, we attended Fair Board meetings as part of the outreach to explain processes to all interested board members. Here is some information about weigh-ins and certification procedures.

The scales used at the Fairfield County Fair are certified by the Fairfield County Auditor's Office's Weights and Measures Inspectors prior to the Fair. Fair Board members are present for scale testing. Patrick Brighton and Carter Corcoran, Weights and Measures Inspectors, are present throughout the Fair.

The Auditor's Office seal present on the scale certifies that testing took place.

The Auditor's Offices Weights and Measures Inspectors use standardized, consistent national practices to certify the scales. They will talk with anyone interested in the certification of scales. They are trained and certified for their positions, have extensive educational requirements, and follow industry guidelines and rules.

Numerous quality assurance measures are in place to ensure the scales are accurate and sound.

Weights & Measures Facts

- All standard weights currently derive from the kilogram (Ex. 1 lb = 0.45359237 kg).
- The kilogram standard is no longer a physical object that other objects are measured against; it is now defined by fixing the numerical value of the Planck constant to be exactly $6.62607015 \times 10^{-34} \text{ kg}\cdot\text{m}^2\cdot\text{s}^{-1}$.
- This means that the exact weight of a kilogram can be replicated in any lab, and there is no physical standard that can degrade & change the standard weight of everything.
- The term mass is derived from the Greek word maza, meaning irregular-shaped lump (pertaining to a sort of dough).
- In Fairfield County, there are 1600 gasoline pumps inspected annually.

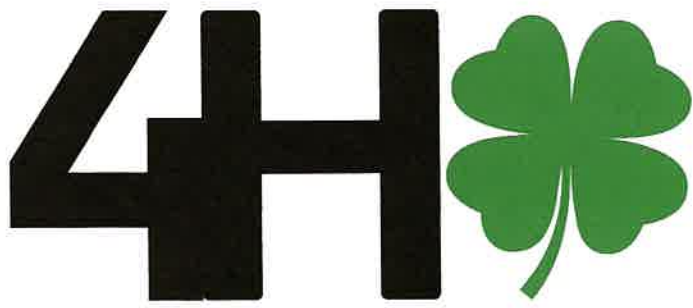

Commissioner Davis and Trustee Yates,

I want to let you know the Ohio Power Siting Board has issued the Letter of Completeness for the proposed Eastern Cottontail Solar project, case #24-0495-EL-BGN, one of the major steps in the review process. After an application is submitted, the OPSB staff conducts a preliminary review to ensure the application contains the information necessary to begin an investigation. It is not an indication of whether the project will be approved. The Letter of Completeness states the application complies with the requirements listed in the Ohio Administrative Code. A copy of the letter is attached.

Next steps: Now that the Completeness Letter has been issued, the OPSB staff will begin its investigation. In addition, dates will be set for the local public hearing in Fairfield County, the evidentiary hearing in Columbus, and the deadline to intervene in the case. If the commissioners and trustees would like to intervene in the project, you should work with the Fairfield County prosecutor to file a notice of intervention with the OPSB. The deadline to intervene has not been set, and I will let you know once I have that deadline, as well as the public hearing date and location.

Senate Bill 52: As you may know, the passage of SB 52 provides new opportunities for county commissioners and township trustees to participate in the siting of solar and wind projects in their community. The Eastern Cottontail Solar project is partially impacted by the legislation; it is grandfathered under SB 52 except for the ad hoc board member provision. I've attached a graphic that helps explain when a project is grandfathered that you may find useful.

WHEN IS A SOLAR PROJECT “GRANDFATHERED?”

Every energy project that wants to tie into the power grid must conduct a series of studies as part of PJM’s interconnection process. This helps ensure the project can plug into the electric grid safely and without disruption.

The legislature recognized that lengthy process by including a transition period to Senate Bill 52 before it is fully implemented. The law allows solar projects already in the pipeline to be “grandfathered” and not subject to the law’s conditions.



Tier 1: Completely grandfathered projects

Exempt from all Senate Bill 52 (SB 52) provisions. Completely grandfathered projects have received:

- System impact study from PJM by Oct. 11, 2021,
- Paid the PJM application fee by Oct. 11, 2021, and
- OPSB Letter of Completeness by Oct. 11, 2021.

Tier 2: Partially grandfathered projects

Exempt from SB 52 except for the addition of ad hoc board members to represent the local community. Partially grandfathered projects have received:

- System impact study from PJM by Oct. 11, 2021, and
- Paid PJM fees by Oct. 11, 2021.
- Have **not** received the OPSB Letter of Completeness by Oct. 11, 2021.

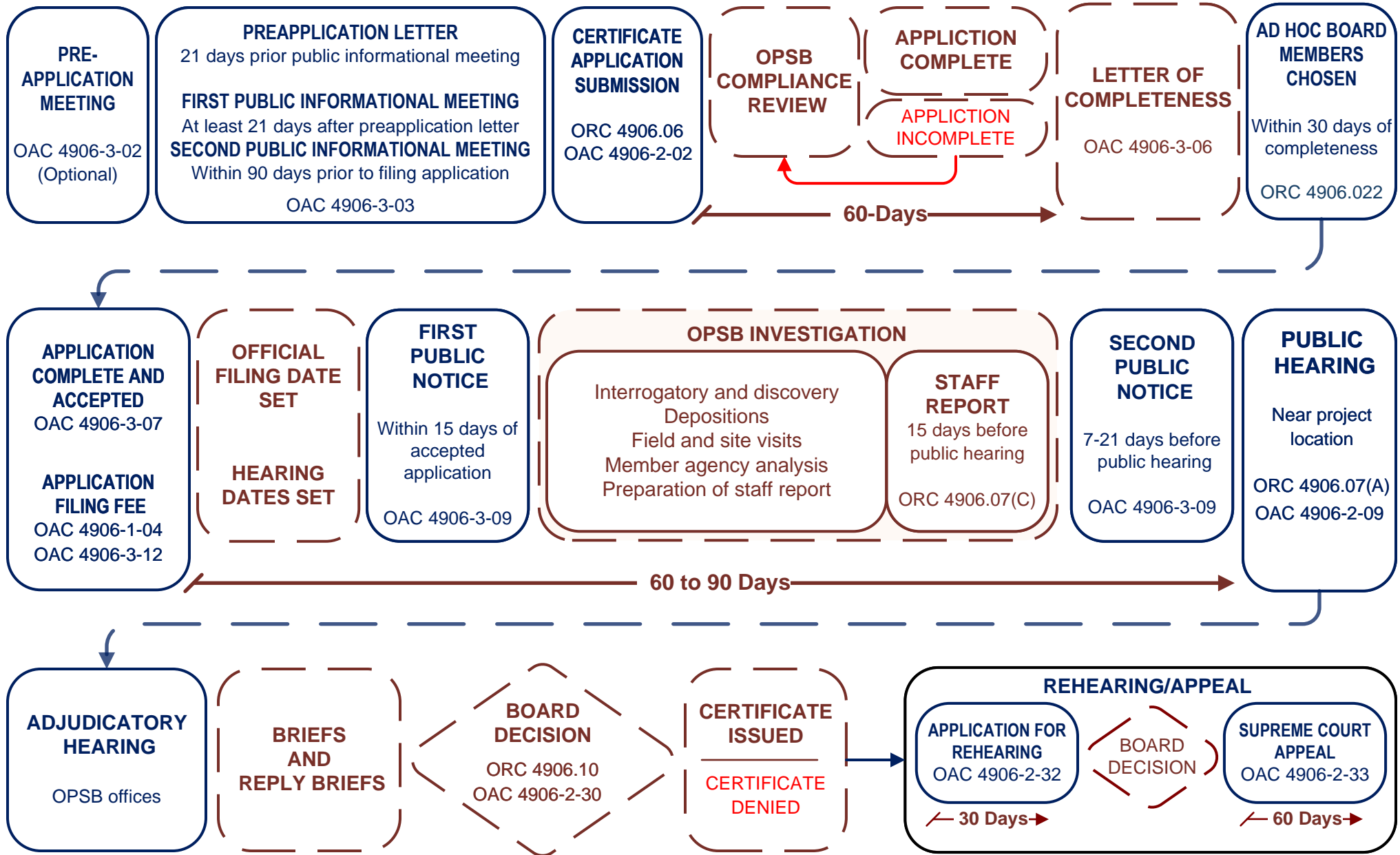
Tier 3: Full implementation of Senate Bill 52

Projects will first go to the county commissioners for approval before heading to the OPSB. Will include ad hoc board members and may have areas in the county restricted from solar development.

Projects that are completely subject to SB 52 have **not**:

- Received system impact study from PJM by Oct. 11, 2021,
- Paid PJM fees by Oct. 11, 2021, or
- Received the OPSB Letter of Completeness by Oct. 11, 2021.

This letter is to inform you that the above referenced application, filed with the Ohio Power Siting Board (Board) on July 31, 2024, has been found to comply with Chapters 4906-01, et seq., of the Ohio Administrative Code (Ohio Adm.Code). This means the Board's staff (Staff) has received sufficient information to begin its review of this application. During the course of its investigation, the Staff may request additional information to ensure Staff can continue to conduct its review of the application, including, but not limited to:

- Plans for grazing management if sheep are to be used for vegetation management.
- Identification of Ohio Department of Agriculture Farmland Preservation Easements within or near the proposed project area.
- Additional information pertaining to soils management and grading.
- Information to ensure conformance with Ohio Department of Natural Resources' Guidance for Proposed Solar Energy Facilities.
- Documentation of coordination with the State Historic Preservation Office regarding vegetative screening mitigation and the Phase II assessment/avoidance plan for archaeology sites.

Pursuant to Board rules, the certified application and supplements must now be filed with the Board in accordance with the provisions of Ohio Adm.Code Rules 4906-3-06 and 4906-3-07. In summary form, these rules require:

1. Serving copies of the certified application upon appropriate government officials and public agencies. In this regard, please inform these officials in writing that if they wish to



intervene in the proceedings, they must file a notice of intervention with the Board within thirty days of being served a copy of the application.

2. Filing Proof of Service with the Board.

Upon completion of these requirements, you will be notified of the effective date of filing and the date and location of the public hearing.

Please be informed that under Section 4906.04 of the Ohio Revised Code (R.C.), the applicant shall not commence to construct any portion of the facility prior to obtaining a certificate from the Board.

Also be informed that to assist your company in meeting the provisions of Ohio Power Siting Board rules, the Board will serve as a clearinghouse for the distribution to and service of the application and supplements upon the following state agencies:

- Public Utilities Commission of Ohio
- Ohio Environmental Protection Agency
- Ohio Department of Agriculture
- Ohio Department of Development
- Ohio Department of Health

Upon filing, pursuant to R.C. 4906.06(F) and Ohio Adm.Code Rule 4906-3-12, the amount of \$110,000.00 is an application fee.

You will receive an invoice from the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, Finance Department.

Payment of the application fee is due within 30 days.

Please file proof of payment in the docket.

Depending on the complexity of the staff investigation, the application fee may not cover all costs associated with this case. Additional invoicing may be necessary.

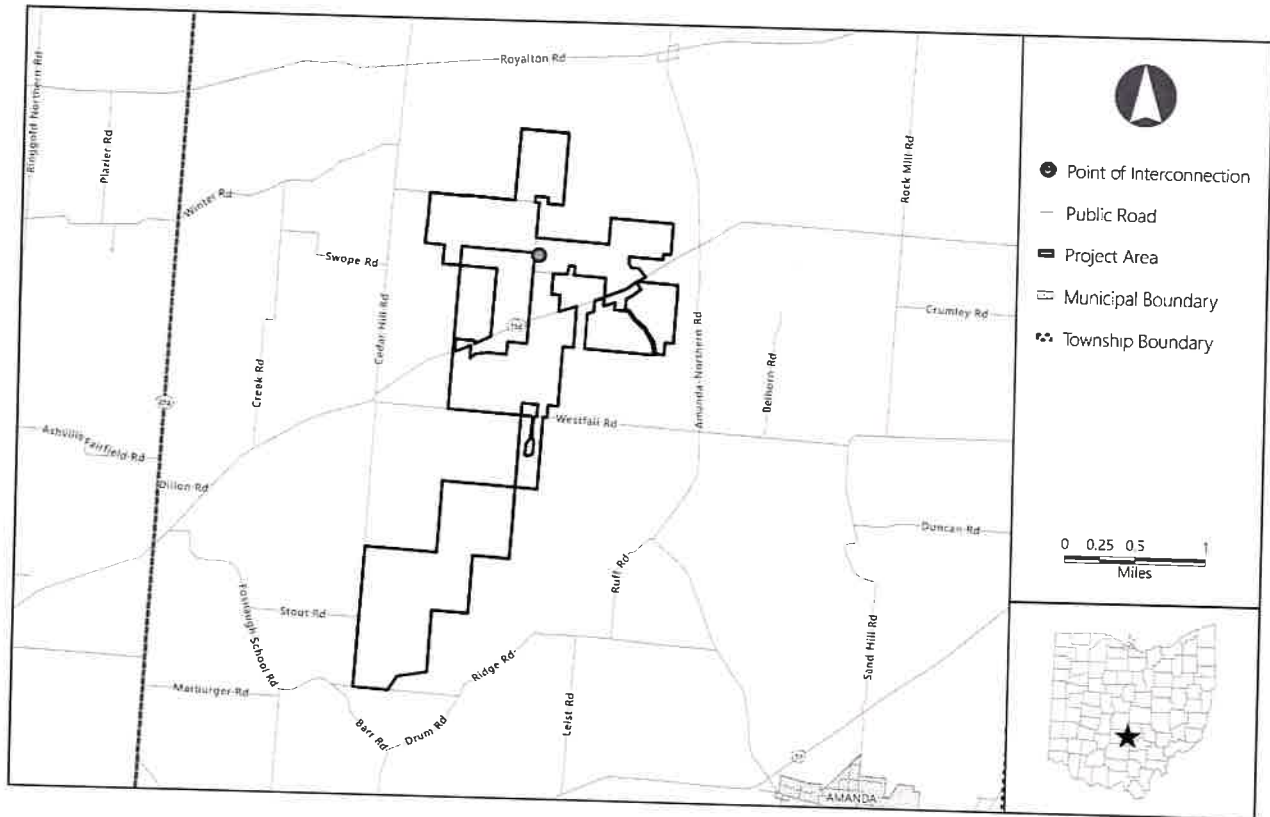

Main Street, Amanda, Ohio 43102. The purpose of this meeting is to notify the public about the Project and solicit input on the scope of the Project.

The Public Information Meeting will be held in an open house format. Representatives from the Project, including various subject matter experts, will be available to answer questions about the Project. Information about the Project developer, facility location, construction process, environmental studies, and economic benefits of the project will be provided at various stations at the meeting location. Written comments from the public will be collected at the meeting and considered in the preparation of the application to the Ohio Power Siting Board ("OPSB"). In addition, Staff from the OPSB will be present to answer questions about the OPSB permitting process.

About the Project

The Project is a proposed up to 142 megawatt (MW) solar energy project under development in Amanda Township in Fairfield County. The Project will maximize energy production from solar resources to deliver electricity to the regional transmission system to serve the needs of electric utilities and their customers. The Project is being developed by Carnation Solar, LLC, a subsidiary of National Grid Renewables Development, LLC. Ohio Power Siting Board Process

Under Ohio Law, electric generating facilities capable of producing 50 MW or more must apply for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need from the OPSB. The OPSB provides for a single unified process by which applicants can obtain a certificate to construct and operate an electric generating facility.

The OPSB certification process includes public information meetings, submittal of a certificate application (R.C. 4906.06), 60-day staff completeness review, application acceptance, OPSB staff review and recommendation, a public hearing (R.C. 4906.07), an adjudicatory hearing, and certificate issuance or denial (R.C. 4906.10). There are various avenues for public participation throughout the permitting process. This includes commenting on the docket and attending public hearings. Additionally, persons who desire to intervene in the OPSB proceeding may do so in accordance with Ohio Adm. Code 4906-2-12.

As required by the OPSB, property owners and tenants receiving this letter will also receive written notice of the public hearing. In addition, you can sign up to receive electronic notifications about this proceeding directly from the OPSB, by either subscribing to OPSB news releases, or subscribing to the OPSB case (Case No. 24-0881-EL-BGN) at dis.puc.state.oh.us.

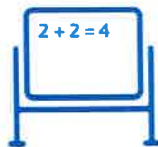

The YMCA board of directors has created an endowment fund and Legacy Club honoring those who have made a commitment to provide for the future of our YMCA.

Family YMCA of Lancaster & Fairfield County Legacy Club members, by their current or planned gift, ensure that the values of caring, honesty, respect, and responsibility endure and that Y programs will positively impact our community for generations to come.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS RELATED TO OUR LEGACY CLUB

How can I or our family become a member of the Family YMCA Legacy Club? Any donor who gives a meaningful gift to the YMCA endowment fund is considered a member.

If I cannot give a large gift, will a small gift really make a difference? We know that everyone has different personal circumstances. Even small gifts will make a huge difference as the Y endowment fund is a segregated fund where the principal of donor-designated gifts is held into perpetuity. The endowment fund is invested and the Y uses only the return on investment for annual support.

Can I designate my gift for a specific purpose? Many donors choose to leave their gift unrestricted to allow the Y governing board to direct the earnings where the need is greatest. However, the Family YMCA of Lancaster and Fairfield County has specific options to which you can designate your funds: (1) undesignated for highest needs at the time, (2) for use at a specific branch, (3) for facility improvements, and (4) for high-priority programs identified by the board of directors.

What types of gifts could I give? Therefore, options are available to meet individual circumstances. The majority of gifts are received in these forms:

- Current gifts of cash or cash equivalents
- Planned gifts including:
 - Bequests through wills
 - Naming the Y as a beneficiary of retirement plans
 - Naming the Y as a beneficiary of insurance policies
 - Living trusts
 - Charitable trusts

What is the proper wording I should use to assure my gift is designated as I wish?

Here is an example of wording you could use: "I give to the Family YMCA of Lancaster and Fairfield County, a non-profit, 501(c)(3) corporation, incorporated in Ohio, the sum of \$ (or ## percent of the remainder of my estate) to be deposited in the YMCA's endowment fund. The income shall be used to benefit said YMCA in such manner as the board of directors thereof may direct."

WHEREAS, in 2018 MOW requested and the Board agreed, that the Board place on the November ballot a five year-renewal and increase of the Levy, which was approved by the voters of Fairfield County, thereby increasing the millage to a rate not exceeding 0.8 mill for each one dollar of valuation, said renewal and increase commencing on January 1, 2019, first due in calendar year 2020(“the Levy”);

WHEREAS, in 2023 MOW requested and the Board agreed, that the Board place on the November ballot a five year-replacement of the Levy, which was approved by the voters of Fairfield County, thereby increasing the millage to a rate not exceeding 0.8 mill for each one dollar of valuation, said renewal and increase commencing on January 1, 2024, first due in calendar year 2025(“the Levy”);

WHEREAS, the replacement levy continues to be “for the purposes of supporting services for older adult residents (aged 60 and older) provided by or through Meals on Wheels Older Adult Alternatives of Fairfield County, including but not limited to: home delivered meals, congregate site meals and activities, nutrition education, nutrition counseling, caregiver relief and support services, minor home repair and chores assistance, transportation and other aging services”;

WHEREAS, MOW has in the past, and intends in the future, to provide supportive services to older adult residents (a) through its own staff, employees, and volunteers; (b) by contracting with persons and entities other than MOW to provide such supportive services to older adults; and (c) by providing grants to other persons or organizations to supply such services;

AGREEMENT

This agreement is entered into this _____ day of _____, 2024, by and between The Fairfield County Board of Commissioners with offices located at 210 East Main Street, Lancaster, Ohio 43130 (hereinafter the "Board"), and Meals on Wheels-Older Adult Alternatives of Fairfield County, Inc., an Ohio Corporation, with offices located at 1515 Cedar Hill Road, Lancaster, Ohio 43130 (hereinafter "MOW").

WHEREAS, in 2004 the Board as then constituted, placed a five-year property tax levy ("the Levy") on the ballot at a rate not exceeding 0.5 mill for each one dollar of valuation for the purpose of supporting services for older adult residents (age 60 and older) "provided by and through Meals on Wheels"; and

WHEREAS, the electors of Fairfield County approved a renewal of the Levy in 2008, and a renewal in 2013, and MOW has received funds as a result of the Levy to provide the services set forth in the Levy; and

WHEREAS, in 2018 MOW requested and the Board agreed, that the Board place on the November ballot a five year-renewal and increase of the Levy, which was approved by the voters of Fairfield County, thereby increasing the millage to a rate not exceeding 0.8 mill for each one dollar of valuation, said renewal and increase commencing on January 1, 2019, first due in calendar year 2020; and

WHEREAS, in 2023 MOW requested and the Board agreed, that the Board place on the November ballot a five year-replacement of the Levy, which was approved by the voters of Fairfield County, thereby replacing the millage to a rate not exceeding 0.8 mill for each one dollar of valuation, said renewal and increase commencing on January 1, 2024, first due in calendar year 2025 ("the Replacement Levy" or "the Levy"); and

WHEREAS, the Replacement Levy continues to be "for the purposes of supporting services for older adult residents (aged 60 and older) provided by or through Meals on Wheels Older Adult Alternatives of Fairfield County, including but not limited to: home delivered meals, congregate site meals and activities, nutrition education, nutrition counseling, caregiver relief and support services, minor home repair and chores assistance, transportation and other aging services";

WHEREAS, MOW has in the past, and intends in the future, to provide supportive services to older adult residents (a) through its own staff, employees, and volunteers; (b) by contracting with persons and entities other than MOW to provide such supportive services to older adults; and (c) by providing grants to other persons or organizations to supply such services; and

WHEREAS, both the Board and MOW intend through this agreement to set forth their respective duties and responsibilities in connection with the operation of MOW and the funding and provision of services pursuant to the Levy including, but not limited to, the manner in which public funds received pursuant to the Levy are expended and accounted for;

NOW THEREFORE, for adequate consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledge, and intending to be legally bound, the Board and MOW agree as follows:

Section 1. General Matters

- 1.01. For purposes of this agreement, the fiscal year shall begin on January 1 and terminate on December 31.
- 1.02. For purposes of this agreement the indicated terms are defined as follows:
 - 1.02.01 "Agreement services" shall mean services, provided by a person or organization other than MOW, in accordance with the purposes of the Levy and that are provided to support older residents as set forth in the Levy and shall include, but not be limited to, the following: Home delivered meals, caregiver support, transportation assistance, congregate meals programming, minor home repair and chores, adult day care, respite care, personal care, home health care, medical assistance, and homemaker services. These services will generally be provided by social service agencies, social service companies, social service not-for-profit organizations, and/or private individuals and the services may be provided on a continuing basis.
 - 1.02.02 "Grant" or "grants" shall mean appropriation of Levy funds for projects for supporting services for older residents of Fairfield County when such services are not a part of the normal operations of MOW, are not agreement services, and said levy funds are not appropriated directly to MOW.
 - 1.01.01 "Older residents" shall mean those residents of Fairfield County who are aged 60 or older.
 - 1.01.02 "Levy fund" shall mean the fund created and held by Fairfield County wherein all revenues derived from the levy are deposited.
- 1.02. MOW shall keep current and accurate accounts of its use of the moneys it receives by or through the Levy. The Board or its designee may review MOW's accounts of its use of the moneys it receives by or through the Levy on reasonable notice to MOW. MOW's current records retention policy is to retain such records for seven years. MOW will inform the Board of any changes to its record retention policy.
- 1.03. MOW acknowledges and agrees that it is subject to certain audits by the Auditor of State ("AOS") of the State of Ohio and shall fully and completely cooperate in any audit lawfully conducted by the AOS.
 - 1.03.01 In those years, if any, that the AOS does not conduct an audit of MOW, MOW shall hire a private certified public accounting firm to conduct an audit of its books and records since the last completed audit by the AOS or

by a private certified public accounting firm, which is more recent in time. Such audit performed in accordance with rules adopted by the AOS under Revised Code Section 117.20. The written results of that audit shall be provided to the Board promptly after they are received by MOW.

- 1.03.02 MOW shall promptly send to the Board a copy of any audit report concerning MOW promptly upon its completion.
- 1.04. MOW shall immediately repay to the levy fund, using non-levy fund monies, any levy fund monies that are improperly expended by MOW. If MOW is unable to immediately repay such monies, the Board may, in its sole discretion, use county general fund monies to reimburse the levy fund for improperly expended monies. In such event, MOW will reimburse the county general fund, using non-levy fund revenues, on such terms as set by the Board.
- 1.05. MOW shall repay to the Board all county monies remaining unused at the end of the fiscal year or other accounting period for which the Board paid the moneys except that, when the recipient is to receive county moneys in the next succeeding fiscal year or other accounting period following the fiscal year or other accounting period for which the Board pays the moneys, the recipient need not repay the county moneys remaining unused. Any such monies repaid by MOW to the Board shall be deposited into the levy fund.
- 1.06. MOW shall provide the Board annually a summary of the service activities it has performed with county moneys.
- 1.07. The parties agree that this agreement shall be in effect from January 1, 2025, until all funds collected pursuant to the 5-year Replacement Levy approved on November 7, 2023, have been expended.
- 1.08. The parties agree that there are three separate procedures to be set out herein. One procedure is for appropriating funds for the operation of MOW. The second procedure is for appropriating funds for agreement services. The third procedure is for appropriating funds for grants.
- 1.09. The parties agree that MOW Board Members, employees, or any members of their immediate families or persons with whom they share a common residential address or location are all prohibited from receiving grant money, directly or indirectly from the Levy and are also prohibited from providing agreement services paid for by Levy funds. No MOW Board member who is also a member of or has a direct or indirect ownership in an organization that wishes to provide agreement services in connection with MOW shall participate in, or otherwise attempt to use its authority or influence to effect, the decision-making process regarding said agreement. Any MOW Board Member who is also a member of an organization that is applying for grant money shall take no part

in the discussions, nor directly or indirectly attempt to influence the decision, regarding the funding of that particular grant request and shall not vote on that particular grant request. In all events, any MOW Board member who is a member of an organization or who has an ownership interest in an organization that is seeking to either obtain a grant or provide agreement services shall fully disclose in writing to all members of the MOW Board the nature and extent of such MOW Board member's relationship and ownership interest, if any, with that organization.

Section 2. Procedure for Appropriating Levy Funds for the Operation of MOW

- 2.01. Each year MOW shall prepare a proposed budget for the operation of MOW for the next fiscal year and submit it to the Board by no later than March 1. Such budget shall include, proposed line items of all MOW operations, whether or not funded by the Levy.
- 2.02. MOW shall include a line item for agreement services and line item(s) for expenditures of levy funds for grants. In the line item(s) for grants, MOW shall specify the grantee in the budget request. No general request for grants shall be appropriated to MOW as part of the budget appropriation. The procedure for appropriating levy funds to grants will be set out herein.
- 2.03. The Board shall submit the tax budget of which MOW's budget shall be a part to the Budget Commission.
- 2.04. The Budget Commission shall review the Board's tax budget in the normal course of business. MOW may be invited to hearing(s) at the Budget Commission at the Budget Commission's discretion. MOW may request hearing(s) with the Budget Commission pursuant to procedures established by the Budget Commission.
- 2.05. The Board shall place on the voting agenda for approval the budget of MOW in the same manner and at the same time the Board approves the budgets for other boards of the county.
- 2.06. MOW may apply to the Board to have the appropriation for the operating budget of MOW amended anytime throughout the fiscal year. If MOW seeks to amend its budget then it shall (a) meet with the Board to explain the reason behind the proposed amendment and (b) thereafter submit a resolution for the Board to consider. The Board shall consider MOW's request in the normal course of business. The Board may request from MOW and MOW shall provide to the Board upon its request information regarding the request. The Board will review the request for compliance with the ballot language. The Board shall vote on MOW's request and shall not withhold any appropriation without good cause and by unanimous vote of the Board.

Section 3. Procedure for Appropriating Levy Funds for Agreement Services

- 3.01. Agreement with Service Providers - No goods or services shall be provided by any service provider to or on behalf of MOW until (a) MOW and such service provider have entered into a written agreement for the goods or services to be provided by that service provider and (b) there has been compliance with the other provisions of this Section 3.
- 3.02. Each such agreement with a service provider shall state the maximum dollar amount that is payable to that service provider under the agreement, the rate which the service provider is to be paid per unit of service, and the services that the service provider will provide to the client. The agreement shall also require the service provider to submit monthly invoices to MOW stating the date of the services provided, the services provided, the number of units of service, the rate per unit of service, and the total amount owed to the service provider for the dates of the invoice. Each such invoice shall also contain the name, mailing address, contact person, and telephone number of the service provider.
- 3.03. Obtaining a Fiscal Certificate - Before MOW may enter into any agreement with a service provider, MOW shall submit a purchase order to the Fairfield County Auditor's Office and shall obtain a fiscal certificate stating that there are sufficient funds available to satisfy the maximum amount that could be owed to the service provider under the terms of the agreement. Such fiscal certificate shall be obtained before MOW may enter into any agreement with a service provider.
- 3.04. Submission to the County Auditor - MOW shall submit a copy of the fully executed service provider agreement to the Fairfield County Auditor's Office for its records.
- 3.05. Payment of Service Provider Invoices - MOW shall submit the service provider's invoice to the Fairfield County Auditor's Office with a statement requesting that the invoice be paid and identifying other sources of payment to be allocated to said invoice.
- 3.06. Invoices for services that are in compliance with the terms of the service agreement for that service provider shall be paid directly to the service provider. The Board shall request that the Fairfield County Auditor pays these invoices in due course. Any questions about a particular invoice will be directed to MOW. The invoice will not be paid until all questions have been satisfactorily resolved.
- 3.07. Maximum Payment Under Service Agreement - If the service provider has performed services in an amount equal to the maximum amount allowed under the service agreement, then the service provider shall perform no further services under such agreement and MOW shall not pay the service provider any compensation in excess of the maximum amount allowed under the agreement. Any subsequent agreement with the service provider shall follow the procedure set out herein. Nonetheless, if:

- 3.07.01 a service provider has performed services in an amount equal to the maximum amount allowed under the service agreement,
 - 3.07.02 the County Auditor verifies that money is available to re-allocate within the contractual services line item, and
 - 3.07.03 MOW requests and receives the prior approval of the Board, then MOW may reallocate all or a portion of the available funds as approved by the Board in order to provide continuity of the contracted services.
- 3.08. Similarly, if a service provider should close without performing all contractual services provided for in the service agreement, then, with the prior approval of the Board, the funds reflecting the unearned portion of the service agreement with the now closed service provider may be re-allocated to another service provider.

Section 4. Procedure for Appropriating Funds for Grants

- 4.01. MOW shall prepare an application form appropriate to the requesting party. The Board shall review the form for the purposes of determining if the form complies with the ballot language. If changes to the form are needed to be made to provide better or more efficient processing of the applications, MOW may amend the form. MOW shall submit the amended form to the Board. The Board shall review the amended form for the purpose of determining if the amended form complies with the ballot language. Any amended form shall contain the date of amendment or effective date of the form.
- 4.02. MOW shall prepare a criteria form appropriate for the requesting party. Said criteria form shall be used in evaluating all grant applications. Said criteria form shall contain space beside each criterion to indicate that MOW has reviewed the application and determined if it has met the criterion. If changes to the criteria form are needed to be made to provide better or more efficient evaluations of the applications, MOW may amend the form. MOW shall submit the amended form to the Board. The Board shall review the amended form for the purposes of determining if the amended form complies with the ballot language. Any amended form shall contain the date of amendment or effective date of the form.
- 4.03. All requests for grant funds for supporting services for older adults shall be made on the application form (or amended application form) prepared by MOW and shall be submitted during the month of September only.
- 4.04. The application shall be submitted to a designee determined by MOW.
- 4.05. The application shall be reviewed in the manner determined by MOW within 45 days of the end of the month of submission.

- 4.06. The review team may in its discretion request the applicant to appear before the review team to provide further information. The applicant may request a meeting with the review team to provide additional information.
- 4.07. MOW or its designee shall use the criteria form in evaluating the application. MOW or its designee shall mark the criteria form indicating if the applicant has met each criterion.
- 4.08. The MOW Board of Trustees will only vote on grant applications as recommended by the review team at the November meeting. A quorum of the MOW Board of Trustees shall be present before a vote may be taken on a grant application. A majority of the quorum must vote to recommend to the Board that the grant application be funded. A verbal presentation describing the grant application may be given by a member of the Executive Committee of the MOW Board of Trustees in addition to providing the written criteria scoring summary prior to the vote. The MOW Board of Trustees may table the grant application request if the majority of trustees present want additional information or when a quorum of the MOW Board of Trustees is not present. The MOW Board of Trustees may vote to fully fund, partially fund or not to fund a grant application.
- 4.09. After voting to recommend that the grant application be funded, MOW shall contact the Fairfield County Auditor's Office and secure written documentation that there exist sufficient Levy funds to provide the requested money to the applicant.
- 4.10. Within ten business days of voting to recommend that the application be funded, MOW shall cause to be delivered a copy of the grant application, a copy of the criteria scoring summary form, the vote of approving that the grant application be funded by the Levy, and the documentation from the Fairfield County Auditor's Office, to the Board. Collectively, the above materials shall be known as the "Grant Approval Package".
- 4.11. Within fourteen days of receiving the documents listed in Section 4.10, the Board shall review said documents for compliance with the procedures set out herein and compliance with the ballot language. The Board may request additional information on any or all applications, which MOW shall provide prior to a final determination on any or all applications. The Board shall vote on the application at the next regularly scheduled meeting following the expiration of the fourteen-day review period.
- 4.12. Applications must be approved by a majority vote of the Board. MOW shall have the right to petition the Board reconsideration should the Board vote to defeat any MOW approval grant application.
- 4.13. If the Board votes to fund an application, the Board in the normal course of business will provide funds directly to the applicant. Applicant must certify in writing that the funds will be used for the purpose(s) set out in the application. Applicant must further

certify that if applicant is unable to perform the project as set out in the application, then applicant agrees to return the funds to the Board.

Section 5. MOW Board Membership

- 5.01. As established in the agreement dated 10/28/2014, the Fairfield County Board of Commissioners shall have the authority to appoint two members for a three-year term as a member of the MOW Board of Trustees beginning with the effective date of this contract.
- 5.02. Board appointees shall be bound by MOW's Code of Regulations, Bylaws, or any other governance documents.

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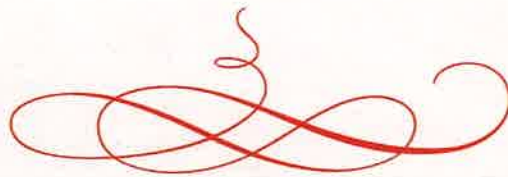

for a Legally Valid 2024 General Election




Whereas It is a recognized civil right in the United States for every citizen to have free and fair elections. “And the right of suffrage can be denied by a debasement or dilution of the weight of a citizen’s vote just as effectively as by wholly prohibiting the free exercise of the franchise.” (Reynolds v. Sims, 377 U.S. 533 (1964))

Whereas It is the duty of our election officials to guarantee our elections are accurate and free from distortion or manipulation. “Congress seeks...to guard the election of members of Congress against any possible unfairness by compelling... everyone concerned in holding the election to a strict and scrupulous observance of every duty devolved upon him while so engaged... The evil intent consists in disobedience to the law.” (In Re Coy, 127 U.S. 731 (1888))

Whereas Our constitutional system of representative government only works when the following four tenets of an election are upheld:

1. The Voter Rolls Must Be Accurate (National Voter Registration Act, 1993).
2. Votes Counted Must Be From Eligible Voters (US Constitution, Fourteenth Amendment, Section Two).
3. The Number of Votes Counted Must Equal the Number of Voters Who Voted.
4. There Can Be No More Than One in 125,000 Ballots in Error by the Voting System (Help America Vote Act, 2002).




Whereas An open-source audit of the Ohio 2022 General Election conducted by Ohio state citizens has uncovered evidence of massive inaccuracies that violate both Federal and State laws, including:

- ◆ **1,046,431** ineligible or uncertain registration violations found within the Ohio State voter roll database.
- ◆ **602,631** votes cast by ineligible or uncertain registrants.
- ◆ **1,162,079** more votes counted than voters who voted in the 2022 general election at the time of certification. No one knows who cast them.
- ◆ **713,262** apparent voting violations in excess of the legal standard of system accuracy for a valid federal election. Maximum allowable system errors for the 2022 general election in Ohio was **34**.
- ◆ Certification as defined by law, an attestation of accuracy and compliance, appears to have been fraudulent and illegal.

Whereas These findings trample legal accuracy requirements of the voting system during a Federal Election. Accuracy is defined as the ability of the system to capture and report the specific selections, and absence of selections, made by a voter without error.

Whereas The intent of the voters must be known factually before certification can be lawfully conducted. Certification of an election that varies from the law is an abridgement of the civil rights of the citizens, a fraud *ab initio*. (United States v. Throckmorton, 98 U.S. 61 (1878)). “From time immemorial, an election to public office has been, in point of substance, no more and no less than the expression by qualified electors of their choice of candidates.” (United States v. Classic, 313 U.S. 299 (1941))

Whereas Ohio’s 2022 General Election appears to have been invalid, depriving us of the guaranteed protection of our Natural Rights under a government duly and provably chosen by us, the American people, resulting in incalculable damage to our families, our way of life, and the fabric of these United States.

Therefore We call upon our Representatives to provide relief to the people, and the assurance of domestic tranquility, by joining us in demanding a VALID 2024 General Election that upholds these existing laws, and equitable principles of law:

1. Proof of citizenship, identity and eligibility to register and vote, not anonymous attestation.
2. Voter rolls certified accurate and available for public review and challenge 30 days before the start of early voting. Voters added after that date must bring proof of citizenship, identity, and address in person to a qualified official at each polling place.
3. Hand-marked, secure ballots similar to currency. Where imaging technology is used for tabulation, the security features must be verifiable in the ballot image.
4. Systems, machines, security measures, infrastructure and conduct are required to be compliant with federal law for fraud prevention regarding risk assessment, certification, testing, and implementation.
5. Adjudication must be signed-off by party, candidate, and trained citizen witnesses after being given full and effective observation rights. Candidates and trained citizens must be allowed immediate access to ballots, ballot images and CVRs.
6. Ballots, regardless of entry source, election operations, and systems must maintain end-to-end chain of custody from voter to vote count to final canvass, including auditability and witnessed transfer with paper records.
7. A NIST-compliant, randomized, statistically valid end-to-end audit, with a 95% confidence level, of all elections pursuant to the 14th Amendment, Section 2 must be performed. These audits are to be conducted by qualified, insured and bonded security, forensics or financial auditors, not personnel from within the election system. Reconciliation will include the vote count, real physical ballots, adjudication, CVRs, ballot count, qualified voter count, custody transfer, and all other paper and electronic election systems, including logs.
8. If the total of all unique variances above is more than 10% of the margin of victory, a new election must be held in the state for those candidates affected, unless the issues can be provably corrected by a manual hand recount and a full review of records.
9. Waiver of requirements is not allowed. Only end-to-end system compliance, from registration through certification, can guarantee the intent of the people is accurately recorded.
